



History

OSAC has long struggled with youth engagement. Being a mature organization where many founding members have stayed involved well into their 70's and 80's, the Arts Councils in some cases have been exclusive more than they have been inclusive in regards to mentoring emerging presenters. This is starting to change a bit in some communities as younger members are joining and getting involved. We see renewed energy and enthusiasm in the communities where younger people have engaged. The goal of the Inspire program is to encourage Arts Councils to begin mentoring the next generation of arts presenters. With tools and financial support provided by OSAC as well as the shared experiences of other arts councils, we hope to help build the future of arts presenting in the province.

A New Approach

OSAC recognizes that there is likely not one solution that will work for our varied membership due to demographics, economical, geographical and cultural factors. A strategy that involves a multitude of varied initiatives is required. The goal will be to build a repertoire of activities and methods that will produce results with some probability of success that can then be replicated in similar communities, but likely not all communities. OSAC understands there will likely be failures and there will be successes that may only work for one community.

Current Youth (29 years and younger) Delegates

The one constant that we have seen with younger members becoming involved in the Arts Councils is exposure to Arts Council events or the arts themselves at a young age. Alysson Mondor, President of the Assiniboia and District Arts Council, was involved in the arts growing up and Marc Holt of the Biggar and District Arts Council and other youth delegates had family members who were involved in the Arts Council and encouraged them to attend Arts Council events in their youth. We plan to model our youth engagement and emerging presenters program around the model of these members' experiences.

I joined the council as a Youth Advisory Member, and went to my first OSAC Showcase. I became hooked instantly! When I started getting involved in the arts, I really found what I was passionate about, and then when my path crossed with the Arts Council and OSAC, my world absolutely took off. It opened up so many different opportunities to me. Organizational Plan

The Inspire program will be the responsibility of the Visual Arts Coordinator. Councils interested in presenting an Inspire exhibition in their community will fill out the Inspire Application form and return it to the Visual & Media Arts Coordinator explaining how they plan to not only present the exhibition that is targeted at youth audiences but also engage them in the presenting of the exhibition. Depending on the uptake from the membership, OSAC will cover 100% of the exhibition fee to a maximum of \$157.50 per Arts Council, up to a total cost of \$1100 for OSAC. If OSAC receives more than 6 proposals, the grant will be reduced to cover all applications.

Idea and Initiative Mining

The application form will ask interested Arts Councils to submit proposals on how they plan to get the youth involved in presenting the exhibition (think opening receptions, workshops, draw and socialize nights, zine making nights, etc.). Ultimately the goal is to develop an Inspire coordinator position at each Council that would present this one exhibition per season under the guidance of the visual arts coordinator. For many new members and emerging visual arts delegates, the idea of taking on an entire program is daunting. A new member may be more willing to take on one exhibition with guidance from a seasoned visual arts coordinator. Our membership know their communities better than we do and what might be effective in Biggar may not work in Kipling. One community might have a very strong printmaking teacher and a student might feel they can present an exhibition like *Cate Francis: Paper Wildlife Conservancy* in their community while another young person might feel an emerging exhibition from a Saskatoon Artist run centre like AKA artist run with *Futures* is something they could market to their peers. The idea is that if we ask the Councils to present their experiences, we will collect a wide range of recruitment and programming methods that we can then share amongst the membership for them to review and decide what might be a fit for their community.

Program Requirements

- The Inspire coordinator should be involved as much as possible in the selection of the exhibition for their Inspire exhibition. We feel the more ownership they have in the process, the more excited and engaged they will be.
- Any community or Arts Council member high school age to 29 is eligible as an Inspire coordinator.
- Any Showcase Exhibition is suitable and eligible for the grant. It would be ideal if Inspire coordinators could attend Showcase in years going forward.
- OSAC will produce manuals for mentors and Inspire coordinators outlining best practices and expectations.

Timelines

Summer – Arts Councils work on selecting an Inspire Coordinator
October – Inspire Coordinator attends OSAC Showcase with their community arts council
October – Showcase weekend to include an Inspire Coordinator meeting
October – Inspire Grant Application sent to Arts Councils
November - Inspire Applications due back to the VA Coordinator by November 10
Ideally within one Year of Showcase the exhibition takes place
Inspire Grant final report due back to the Visual & Media Arts Coordinator within one month of exhibition

OSAC Inspire Program Guide

The goal of the Inspire program is to help OSAC Arts Councils mentor and develop the next generation of visual arts presenters in the province. The attached application form is to be filled out by both the Arts Council VA Coordinator and the Inspire Coordinator.

Finding an Inspire Coordinator: This can be a difficult task. A couple of places to start might be your high school arts classes, or any existing youth members of your arts council. Other places to look might be local art teachers or workshop leaders. Remember we consider anyone under 29 as eligible for the Inspire Coordinator position. There may be parents of children in the programs mentioned above that might consider helping to present one exhibition. The Inspire program is meant to be flexible and we have purposely tried to not mandate what type of exhibition or where the Inspire Coordinator comes from to give Arts Councils flexibility in finding and mentoring the Inspire Coordinator. You may want to also check with your School to see if this program and the students are eligible for credit for volunteering in the community.

Ensuring commitment of the Inspire Coordinator: There are a couple of things you can do to help the Inspire Coordinator take ownership of the exhibition. It is important they have input and choice in selecting the exhibition they are going to help with. This will ensure a higher level of ownership and investment in the program. In future years we will ask that the Inspire Coordinator attend Showcase and be allowed to select the exhibition based on their feelings and beliefs that they can successfully present the exhibition in your community.

Mentoring: The Arts Council must assign a mentor to the Inspire Coordinator that is willing to spend the time helping the Inspire Coordinator fill in the paperwork, market the exhibition, plan any exhibition events, unpack and install the exhibition, strike and pack the exhibition, fill out exhibition forms. Ideally the VA Coordinator will fill this role, but there may be former VA Coordinators, Past-Presidents etc. that could also fill this role.

OSAC Tools: OSAC will provide separate manuals for both the Inspire Coordinators and the Arts Council Mentors that will include resources and guidance to help them in their roles. The OSAC office is of course always available to help with any questions or concerns you may have.

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OSAC Inspire Application Guide

Below are further explanations to the questions on the Application form. We have specifically not elaborated on the Inspire Coordinator questions as they are self-explanatory and will help give both the Arts Council and OSAC a baseline understanding of the Inspire Coordinator.

VA Coordinator Portion

How did the Inspire Coordinator come to your attention?

We are interested to know how the Inspire Coordinator came to your attention because your story when shared with other Arts Councils may inspire another Arts Council to also pursue an Inspire Coordinator in a similar fashion. It might also make them think of a youth member in their community that would be a good fit for the program. A big part of the Inspire program is sharing of experience.

How would you describe the current youth engagement in the arts in your community? In the Arts Council?

We are interested to know the arts ecology in your community and where the Arts Council fits in. There are no wrong answers here as every arts council operated differently. We are looking for possible disconnects and opportunities you see. For example if there are a large number of kids taking Art lessons or showing an aptitude for art in your community, but they are not attending Arts Council events perhaps that is an opportunity the Inspire Coordinator can help explore.

What impact do you see the Inspire program having in your community? In the Arts Council?

Are there specific things you feel the Inspire program will accomplish? Short Term? Long Term? What about your Arts Council? What impact will having the Inspire program in your community have on your Arts Council?
